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COMMON & HISTORICAL TREATMENT OPTIONS FOLLOWING DIAGNOSIS OF ADULT PHIMOSIS.

Following a physical examination by a GP to determine diagnosis of adult Phimosis, the GP may suggest these historically used treatment options:

Manual stretching with hand by pulling foreskin back and forth over glans.

Cons: Risk of paraphimosis (Foreskin getting stuck along shaft requiring emergency room visit)

Prescription of topical steroid cream to assist in softening and stretching foreskin.

Cons: Only about 10% effective, can cause thickening of foreskin leading to tearing and may cause bleeding.

Referral to urologist for review - usually resulting in circumcision or similar surgery.

Common adverse events: Pain, disfigurement, scarring, red blotchy skin, significant loss of sensation, mental health and relationship issues, consequences for partner (longer time to orgasm, increased abrasion of partners internal tissues)

ALTERNATIVE AND CONTEMPORARY TREATMENT RECOMMENDATION FOR ADULT PHIMOSIS:

Following a physical examination by a GP to determine diagnosis of adult Phimosis, the GP refers to Professor David Gillatt and Professor Eric Chung for review of patient's condition and possible inclusion in Novoglan® trial. The Novoglan® TGA treatment option aims to protect foreskin function and benefits through non-surgical foreskin tissue expansion.

Australian led clinical trial of TGA listed non-surgical option for adult phimosis for Australian male residents, aged 18 years or older, living in the metropolitan areas of either Sydney or Brisbane.
